Chairman's Message



Crime Situation in 2003

The year 2003 saw a 5.3% increase in crime, with 33,550 seizeable offences¹ as compared to 2002². While crimes increased in 2003, the number of arrests made by the Police also increased, and by a greater margin. The number of persons arrested for total seizeable offences increased significantly by 8.4% to 23,843 persons in 2003.

As in previous years, theft and related offences³ constituted half of the total seizeable offences. Housebreaking recorded the largest increase of 20.5% while cheating and related offences, robbery, rioting and murder recorded smaller increases between 5% and 9%. On the reverse trend, motor vehicle theft, outraging of modesty, snatch theft and rape recorded decreases between 2% and 9%.

Crime Prevention – A Shared Responsibility

Since its inception in 1981, the Council has met the crime prevention needs of various sectors through security audits, dialogue sessions and crime prevention awareness workshops. In our pursuit to

make Singapore a safer place for all, we have actively engaged the community, business enterprises and social organisations to take ownership of personal security and property.

Our tagline "Crime Prevention - A Shared Responsibility" aptly stresses the need to recognise that crime is a complex social problem that cannot be solved by a single agency. The quintessence of a safe and secure neighbourhood lies in active citizenry and mutual self-help. The commendable spirit of community partnership is perhaps best epitomised in the Neighbourhood Watch Zone Scheme, which has flourished from 26 Neighbourhood Watch Zones in 1997 to 600 today.

The Council firmly believes that with care and knowledge, victimisation amongst the vulnerable can be prevented. Since the Crime Prevention Ambassador (CPA) Project for Senior Citizens Programme began in September 2002, 59 elderly CPAs have been empowered to help educate fellow senior citizens on crime prevention measures using various languages, dialects and tools. The successful project not only reaches out to the elderly and their families, but also provides an avenue to integrate senior citizens back into society as active volunteers after their retirement from the work force.

Staying Relevant in A Dynamic Environment

For the first time, we have leveraged on Rediffusion, an age-old broadcast medium to offer a crime prevention programme targeting over 20,000 households with listeners comprising mainly housewives and senior citizens. While some of the

older populace may respond favourably to Rediffusion, the Council recognises that to get through to the masses, it has to keep up with the dynamic socio-economic landscape.

Riding on the success of our longstanding public education TV programme, *Crime Watch* and two award-winning dramas, *Anak Metropolitan* and *Rehai*, the Council harnessed the power of cinema as a crime prevention tool to reach out to young Singaporeans and their families by commissioning our first movie, *After School*. The Mandarin movie which revolves around the themes of family bonding and juvenile delinquency, is our attempt to stay relevant and bring the crime prevention message across effectively to present and future generations.

Moving with the times too, is the Singapore Police Force, our long time partner in crime prevention. In July 2003, Police accepted the recommendations on the Licensing of Entertainment Outlets (Nightspots), proposed by the Advisory Panel of Licensing (APL), which was set up under the auspices of the Council. Greater flexibility has since been exercised to legalise bar top dancing, as well as 24-hour licensing in some entertainment areas, without compromising law and order.

Rising to the Challenge

As a testament of the Council's efforts in fulfilling its mission, effective delivery of our crime prevention programmes, and excellence in forging community partnership, we are honoured to be awarded the prestigious International Society of Crime Prevention Practitioners State-Province Programs of the Year award in November 2003.

More good news came in March 2004 when the Institute of Public Relations of Singapore conferred the Institute of Public Relations of Singapore's PRISM Excellence Award for Best Public Campaign in 2003 (Government) to the Council, as a reward for best efforts and creativity in communicating to our publics.

The accolades and fruits of labour are not ours alone. We would like to thank our community and partners in crime prevention, for helping us attain what we have today and what we set out for in the future. The ever changing landscape will present new challenges and the NCPC is committed to devise innovative approaches, working hand in hand with our partners and stakeholders to adopt the "Four Ds" of crime prevention - Deterrence, Detection, Delay and Detention. Together, let us make Singapore A Safer Place for All.

Cultivating Our Youth

The NCPC believes that in order to prepare our youth for the opportunities and dangers in a rapidly changing socio-economic landscape, chief among its measures and strategies must be education, starting from the young. As such, many of the Council's crime prevention programmes combine action and education to develop our youth into public-spirited and responsible potential movers and leaders of tomorrow.

Crime Prevention Proficiency Badge Scheme for Uniformed Groups



To incorporate an element of fun in acquiring crime prevention consciousness, the Council introduced the Crime Prevention Proficiency Badge Scheme in 1982, for students in the Uniformed Groups (UG) to attain badges, which they can adorn on their uniforms during Co-Curriculum Activities.

In Financial Year (FY) 2003/04, two sessions of Crime Prevention Proficiency Badge Scheme Workshop for Scouts and Guides Adult Leaders were held on 5 April 2003. Fifty-two adult leaders turned up for the sessions that imparted crime prevention knowledge and skills for administering the Crime Prevention Proficiency Badge scheme in the respective UG.

A series of Crime Prevention Proficiency Badge Scheme Workshops for students in the Scouts, Brownies, Girl Guides and National Police Cadet Corps, were held from January to June 2003. 5,665 students attained the Crime Prevention Proficiency Badge in FY 2003/04, after passing a written test on crime prevention and completing a practical assignment. Since the scheme started, more than 50,000 students from the UGs have attained the Crime Prevention Proficiency Badge.

Crime Prevention Skit Competition for Students

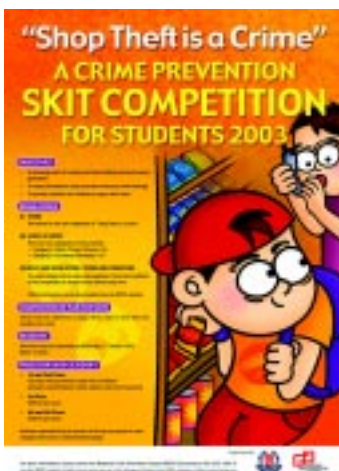
An annual crime prevention competition targeted at students is also held to motivate the young to translate knowledge into practice. In FY 2003/04, a Crime Prevention Skit Competition for the primary and secondary school students was held in August 2003, with the theme for the competition being "Shop Theft is a Crime". The objectives of the competition were:

- i. To encourage spirit of creativity and team building among the young generation.
- ii. To create and enhance crime prevention awareness and knowledge.
- iii. To provide a platform for students to express their ideas.



Crime Prevention Skit Competition for Students

Winners and participants of the competition were awarded prizes during the launch of the annual Festive Season Crime Prevention Campaign 2003/04 held on 15 November 2003. The winning teams for the primary and secondary level categories, i.e. CHIJ - Our Lady of Good Counsel and CHIJ St Nicholas Girls' School, respectively, had also performed during the launch. They were also invited to perform at crime prevention road shows held at neighbourhood shopping malls, as service to the community. Seventeen students from the first and second-placing winning teams of both categories have been awarded a well-deserved crime prevention study trip to Bangkok, Thailand from 9 to 12 December 2003, led by Vice Chairman NCPC.



Crime Prevention Robot Design Competition

With Information Technology fast becoming an integral part of our lives, the Council has explored the development of a robot to help disseminate crime prevention knowledge and messages to the public during exhibitions, school talks and crime prevention related events.

A competition to conceptualise and design the crime prevention robot that can assist in disseminating crime prevention advices was held in January to February 2004. The competition provided a learning opportunity for students to put their classroom knowledge into practice, and was targeted at students from the tertiary institutions, i.e. Institutes of Technical Education, polytechnics and universities. A total of 15 entries were received from eight tertiary institutions.



The Council has completed its judging in March 2004, and would work with relevant institutions to evaluate the feasibility of developing the robot, before looking into the implementation details.

Collaboration with PAGi

Recognising the threats and danger that our youth can be exposed to while surfing the world wide web, the Council co-launched an educational VCD and booklet, entitled *Caught In the Web* with the Parents Advisory Group for the Internet (PAGi) on 27 September 2003. The 10,000 copies of VCD aimed to educate both parents and children on safe netting, the potential danger of on-line chat-relays, chat-rooms and the like. The VCD and booklets have been distributed to parents and youth attending the PAGi training workshops.



Empowering Our Senior Citizens

With care and knowledge, victimisation of the vulnerable can be avoided. As such, many of the Council's crime prevention programmes targeted at the senior citizens hinge on educating the elderly with precautionary measures to protect them from falling prey to criminals.

Crime Prevention Ambassadors Project for Senior Citizens Programme

The Council continues to strengthen its Crime Prevention Ambassador Project for Senior Citizens programme, which it co-founded with the Ministry of Community Development and Sports. Under this programme, senior citizens are appointed as Crime Prevention Ambassadors (CPAs) to work in partnership with the police and grassroots organisations, to educate fellow senior citizens on crime prevention measures.

To meet the increasing demand for CPAs to assist in giving crime prevention talks during exhibitions and chit-chat sessions, as well as to reach out to larger target audience, the Council has appointed a second batch of 28 new CPAs in FY 2003/04. These CPAs received their Certificates of Appointment from Mr Seng Han Thong, Member of Parliament for Ang Mo Kio GRC on 28 September 2003 at the Yio Chu Kang Community Club. The appointed

CPAs have earlier attended a crime prevention training programme to equip themselves with relevant knowledge and skills to better perform their role as an ambassador.

From April 2003 to March 2004, the CPAs conducted a total of 71 chit-chat sessions and provided support for six crime prevention exhibitions carried out by police land divisions. The CPAs have reached out to more than 11,000 people in the same FY.

Reaching out to the elderly through local dialects

To reach out to the non-English and Mandarin-speaking elderly, the Council has translated its existing crime prevention video, *Live Your Golden Years With Crime Prevention*, into local dialects such as Cantonese and Hokkien.

Reaching Out the Elderly through Local Dialects

The Council, in partnership with Rediffusion (Singapore) Pte Ltd - a broadcast station popular with elderly listeners, has also produced a Cantonese and Hokkien crime prevention programme that seeks to heighten awareness of victimisation. The programme offers crime prevention knowledge and insights into crime cases involving senior citizens on a weekly basis, and is one of the popular public education segments on Rediffusion.



Safeguarding Our Community

The safety of our community remains the driving force of all our crime prevention initiatives and programmes. Leveraging on the long-established relationship with the community and grassroots organisations, the Council works relentlessly to ensure that our crime prevention messages strike home through a line up of purposeful initiatives, joint projects and public education programmes.

Crime Watch TV Programme

The Council funded a national public education television programme, *Crime Watch* in 1986. From a bilingual production when it first started, to the current four local languages, *Crime Watch* has become the icon for the Council's outreach programme. The average monthly viewership is 800,000 persons per episode (in all four languages) on local television station.

To reach out to a greater audience, the last season of *Crime Watch* was also screened on TV Mobile that is available on public



buses and even ferries travelling to and fro Bintan Island. This has increased the potential viewership of the programme to an impressive 1.57 million per episode.

Festive Season Crime Prevention

Each season of *Crime Watch* encompasses three segments, i.e. a free segment for public education, an unsolved case segment and a solved case segment showcasing police professionalism. Continuous efforts will be put in to ensure that *Crime Watch* remains relevant and one of the top-rated public education programmes to be broadcast in the four official languages, apart from the local news.

In appreciation of the contributions that individuals have given in the last FY's production, a Crime Watch Appreciation Lunch was held on 20 January 2004. The lunch also provided an occasion for networking with the media, and helped foster greater understanding between the production team, police and the Council management.

Sequence to Malay Social Drama -*Anak Metropolitan*

Beside Crime Watch, the NCPC had also supported two very popular TV programmes, *Anak Metropolitan (City Kids)* and *Rehai (Fingerprints)*.

The first season of *Anak Metropolitan I* had won four major awards at the *Pesta Perdana 6* (Sixth Malay TV Festival) in February 2003 for Best Newcomer, Best Drama, Best Director/Producer –

Drama and the Most Popular Programme. *Rehai* won two top honours at the *Pradhana Vizha* (Award Night for Indian Television and Radio) in June 2003 for Best Actor and Best Drama.

Riding on the success of its two award-winning social dramas, *Anak Metropolitan* and *Rehai*, in Malay and Tamil respectively, the Council came up with the second season of *Anak Metropolitan* in December 2003.

Festive Season Crime Prevention Campaign 2003/04

The Festive Season Crime Prevention Campaign 2003/04 has been launched successfully on the 15 November 2003 at the Ngee Ann City Civic Plaza. The focus of the year's campaign was to lower incidence of robbery, especially against the elderly.

The campaign tagline, "Don't Lose Your Festive Joy to Crime – Crime Prevention: A Shared Responsibility", was crafted to effectively imbue a sense of public-spiritedness, neighbourliness and self-protection among the community. Senior Minister of State for Law and Home Affairs, Associate Professor Ho Peng Kee graced the campaign, amidst great fanfare that include crime prevention skit performances by the winning

schools in the Crime Prevention Skit Competition for Students, and entertaining busker performances from the Singapore Buskers' Festival 2003.

The campaign ran from 15 November 2003 to 29 February 2004, with four crime prevention road shows in neighbourhood shopping malls being held over the campaign period. Publicity collaterals in four languages were also produced to ensure that the messages reach its intended audience.



NCPA Movie -*After School* / 《放学后》

The Council has gone a step further to harness the power of cinema as a crime prevention tool to reach out to young Singaporeans and their families, by commissioning its first Mandarin movie with English subtitles, *After School* or *Fang Xue Hou* (in hanyu pinyin).

Starring local artistes and new talents, the movie revolves around the tumultuous relationship between a woman police inspector and her brother, teenage crushes and clashes. With the theme of family bonding and juvenile delinquency cutting universally across all cultures, *After School* was one of the highlights of the Festive Season Crime Prevention Campaign 2003/04.

After School first premiered as an exclusive screening at the Singapore Polytechnic Convention Centre from 22 November to 7 December 2003. About 23,000 people caught this exclusive screening that was held in conjunction with the annual campaign. A charity gala premiere graced by Senior Minister of State for Law and Home Affairs, Associate Professor Ho Peng Kee was also held on 18 November 2003 at Shaw Towers, Prince 1. The event raised over \$16,218 that was channelled to the Council's crime prevention programmes.



NCPC Movie - After School

Due to the warm reception from the audience, and in accordance with the Council's objective to extend the reach of the movie, *After School* was screened in Cathay Cineplexes Causeway Point and Orchard from 11 to 21 March 2004. The 11-day screening was made possible with support from the Dairy Farm Group, and marks the Council's first foray onto the big screen after being known for producing the popular current affairs programme *Crime Watch* and critically acclaimed social dramas, *Anak Metropolitan* and *Rehai*. The movie also reflects the Council's commitment to stay relevant in changing times.



Enhancing Awareness Towards Car Security

As part of its annual campaign to heighten public sense of crime prevention knowledge, and to further lower incidence of Theft of, and From Vehicle, the Council has partnered MAZDA Motor (Singapore) Pte Ltd, to launch its first crime prevention mural on 4 January 2004. The mural was launched by Guest of Honour Ms Penny Low, Member of Parliament for Pasir Ris-Punggol GRC. This was a pilot crime prevention mural project, which saw walls of 20 multi-storey carparks in Punggol, Rivervale, Seng Kang and Compassvale carrying the crime prevention advice, "Never Park Your Valuables in Your Car".

The Council also took the opportunity to launch its crime prevention message, "Lock, Look, Leave" on each Housing and Development Board (HDB) and Urban Redevelopment Authority (URA) parking coupons. With more than 350,000 parking coupon booklets produced monthly or 80 million coupons used by vehicle owners and drivers yearly, the parking coupon has been chosen as a suitable medium to disseminate crime prevention message to motorists.

Enhancing Awareness Towards Car Security

The Council hopes that these motorists would be constantly reminded to “Lock” all their valuables, “Look” whether they have left any other valuables in their vehicles, and to “Leave” only after ensuring that no valuables are left in their vehicles.

A car decal bearing the same crime prevention message, “Lock, Look, Leave” was also distributed to remind vehicle owners and drivers to adopt the “Three Ls” of securing their vehicles and valuables.

Defending Our Neighbourhoods

The Council has over the years, nurtured the community to recognise that the police are not solely responsible for providing solution to a crime problem. Crime is a complex social problem that cannot be solved by a single agency, and the answer to a safe and secure neighbourhood can only lie in active citizenry and mutual self-help.

Neighbourhood Watch Zone (NWZ) Scheme

The Council works closely with the Police to promote Neighbourhood Watch Zones in both the public and private residential estates. The initiative has expanded to include domestic helpers and estate cleaners who are usually foreigners working in Singapore, so that they too have a sense of ownership of the place. Residents and members of

the NWZs have been encouraged to be on the lookout for crime, and tap on the Short Message System (SMS) facility now popularly used on handphones, as a speedy way of alerting and mobilising one and another.

From a humble 26 NWZs in 1997 to 600 today, these NWZs play an important role in bringing the community together in preventing and combating crime.

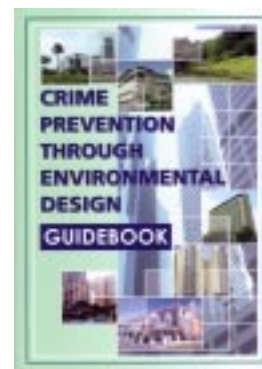
Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design Seminar

Proper design of buildings and their surroundings can play a part in preventing crimes. The Council will be placing more emphasis in this area in the next few years, and will work in partnership with relevant parties such as developers and architects to ensure safety and security of the physical environment. To do this, the Council has conducted a Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) Seminar targeted at architects, developers, professional bodies, community leaders, crime prevention officers and government agencies, on 28 April 2003 at the JTC Summit.

The seminar aims not only to introduce the concepts, scope and application of CPTED but also to generate a heightened sense of understanding towards the relationship between crime prevention and the physical environment. An overwhelming 133 participants attended the inaugural CPTED Seminar.

CPTED Guidelines for Singapore

In consultation with the Seminar guest-speaker, Mr Timothy Crowe, a renowned expert in applied criminology and an established leader in the area of CPTED, the Council produced 2,000 copies of CPTED guidebooks, which have been given out to stakeholders as well as architects and developers in October. The guidebook which has been launched in conjunction with Safety and Security Asia 2003, aimed to generate a heightened sense of understanding towards the relationship between crime prevention and the physical environment.



Uniting on Business Enterprises

In the face of mounting challenges, it is paramount that we need to strive even harder and be more innovative, to ensure that the internal security of our country is not compromised. Security cannot be the sole domain of law enforcement agencies. The government, community, and the business enterprises must join hands to safeguard Singapore's reputation as a safe and secure nation conducive for commerce and tourism.

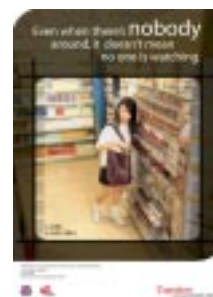
Stop Shop Theft Programme with Dairy Farm Group

The Council supported the Dairy Farm Group's initiative in curbing shop theft in its chain of business outlets via the *Stop Shop Theft* programme launched on 16 July 2003 at The Rock Auditorium. Graced by Senior Minister of State for Law and Home Affairs, Associate Professor Ho Peng Kee, the programme saw a decline in the incidence of shop-theft in Dairy Farm Group's chain of supermarkets and business outlets. Representatives from Dairy Farm Group have also gone on to share its crime prevention strategies with other business enterprises, as way of contributing to the retail industry.



Crime Prevention Committee (CPC)

The Council also encourages the formation of CPC to act as a platform for tenants, shop owners and management to discuss various ways of enhancing the security of retail premises, as well as presenting security issues pertinent to the retail industry. Since its launch in 1982, a total of 134 CPCs have been formed to date.



ASEAN Security Conference cum Launch of Hotel Security Manual

To provide a platform for meaningful exchanges in the area of crime prevention, as well as networking opportunity on an international scale, an inaugural ASEAN Security Conference was organised by the Singapore Hotel Association (SHA), with support from the Council and the Police on 9 December 2003 at the Meritus Mandarin Hotel.

The Council has also leveraged on this conference to launch its Hotel Security Manual, which seeks to provide guidelines to ensure the security of the hotel premises.



ASEAN Security Conference cum Launch of Hotel Security Manual

Security Programme for Hotel Non-Security Personnel

Aimed to help hotel operators and their non-security personnel explore ways to keep hotels free from the horrors of terrorist acts, and to create greater awareness about the crime situation in relation to hotel industry, a series of "Security Programme for Hotel Non-Security Personnel: Employee Awareness and Problem Prevention" was jointly organised by SHA and the NCPC throughout FY 2003/04.

A guest-speaker from the Police Operations Department was invited to brief the participants on security measures and issues that they should be aware of in the course of their duties. About 129 participants attended the five workshops conducted.

Construction Safety Campaign 2003 cum Launch of Crime Prevention Poster for Construction Site Workers

The annual Construction Safety Campaign 2003 was held on 30 October 2003 at the Singapore Contractors Association Limited (SCAL) Construction House Auditorium. A crime prevention poster targeting construction site workers was also launched in conjunction with the campaign.



Security Audits at Construction Sites

The Singapore Construction Safety & Consultancy Private Limited (SC2), a subsidiary of SCAL works closely with the Police to carry out security audits at work sites all over the country. Supported by the Council, a total of four audits were conducted in the year under review.

Advisory Panel on Licensing

An Advisory Panel on Licensing (APL) was formed in November 2001 under the auspices of the Council, to provide feedback on licensing conditions, policies and regulations. The APL aims to provide feedback and advice to the Police on licensing conditions, policies and regulations, so as to benefit the public in the long run.

The Panel has completed its second project "Licensing of Entertainment Outlets (Nightspots)" and the recommendations were submitted to the Ministry in February 2003. A media conference to announce its recommendations was held on 24 March 2003. Of the recommendations, the most significant was that of legalising bar-top dancing which helped to boost the entertainment industry and liven up the Singapore's night scene, without compromising the security of patrons.

The Panel has started working on its third project on the "Licensing of Spa and Massage Establishments" in September 2003. The APL targets to release its recommendations for this project in 2004.

The Council held its fourth corporate retreat at the Marina Country Club Ubin Resort on 27 March 2004. The Council reviewed its existing programmes and revisited its vision and mission during the retreat. New workplan for FY 2004/05 was also formulated to facilitate budget allocation, address crime concerns and develop effective crime prevention programmes.

Testament of Our Efforts

From basic grassroots committees, the council has developed groups to target specialised needs in the construction, retail, hotel, transport and other sectors.

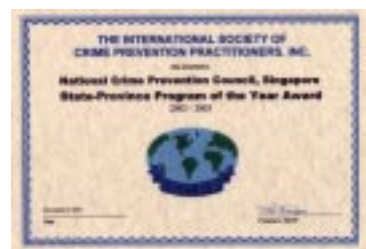
In the commercial building sector alone, there are 127 crime prevention committees comprising 1,770 volunteers who help safeguard shopping centres and industrial complexes.

Notes to the Financial Statements

for the financial year ended 31 March 2004

These notes form an integral part of and should be read in conjunction with the accompanying financial statements.

1. General

The Council is registered in Singapore under the Societies Act. The address of the Council's registered office is:

The principal activities of the Council is to raise funds for the purpose of promoting crime awareness and prevention.

2. Significant accounting policies

(a) Adoption of Singapore Financial Reporting Standards

With the adoption of Singapore Financial Reporting Standards ("FRS") in Singapore with effect from financial years commencing on or after 1 January 2003, the Council has adopted FRS as its reporting framework. Hence, these financial statements, including the comparatives figures, have been prepared in accordance with FRS.

Previously, the Council prepared its financial statements in accordance with Singapore Statements of Accounting Standard. The adoption of FRS does not have any material impact on the accounting policies and figures presented in the financial statements for the financial year ended 31 March 2003.

(b) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Singapore Financial Reporting Standards requires the use of estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of income and expenditure during the financial year. Although these estimates are based on management's best knowledge of current events and actions, actual results may ultimately differ from those estimates.

(c) Measurement currency

Items included in the financial statements are measured using the currency that best reflects the economic substance of the underlying events and circumstances relevant to the Council ("the measurement currency"). The financial statements of the Council are presented in Singapore Dollars, which is also the measurement currency of the Council.

Notes to the Financial Statements

for the financial year ended 31 March 2004

2. Significant accounting policies (continued)

(d) Income and expenditure

Income and expenditure are taken up in the income and expenditure account on an accrual basis.

(e) Taxation

The Council is assessed as a charitable institution under section 13M of the Singapore Income Tax Act. The Council is exempt from income tax if it applies, in any tax year of assessment, not less than 80% of its tax-adjusted income on charitable objects within Singapore by the end of the following financial year.

(f) Fixed assets and depreciation

Fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Depreciation is calculated on a straight-line basis to write off the cost of fixed assets over their expected useful lives. The estimated useful lives are as follows:

Office equipment	-	3 years
Motor vehicle	-	5 years

When an indication of impairment exists, the carrying amount of the asset is assessed and written down immediately to its recoverable amount.

Fully depreciated assets will be retained in the financial statements until they are no longer in use and no further charge for depreciation is made in respect of these assets.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with carrying amount and are included in surplus of income over expenditure.

Repair and maintenance are taken to the income and expenditure statement during the financial year in which they are incurred.

7. Establishment and taxation

The Council was approved as an institution of public character for a further period of 5 years with effect from 1 May 2002. No provision for taxation has been made as the Council has been registered as a charity under the Charities Act (Cap 37).

The receipts of the Council are exempt from tax under Section 13M of the Income Tax Act ("Act"), provided that the Council has utilised eighty percent of its adjusted income for charitable purposes in Singapore in accordance with Section 13M(2)(b) of the Act or obtained a waiver thereof from the Comptroller of Income Tax.

8. Financial risk management

The Council's activities are not exposed to any foreign exchange risk and there is no significant concentration of credit risk. The Council maintains sufficient cash and bank balances for its requirements.

The Council is exposed to interest rate risks arising from interest bearing assets. The Council monitors the interest rate closely to ensure that interest bearing assets are maintained at favourable rates.

9. Fair value

The carrying amounts of the Council's financial assets and liabilities approximate their fair value.

10. Authorisation of financial statements

These financial statements were authorised for issue in accordance with approval of the Council on 7 July 2004.
